
Cheese's Shurfine Food Center Celebrates FIFTY YEARS OF BUSINESS IN LENOX

50 years ago, Ray and Mildred Cheese started a small grocery store on the Lenox Main Street. Mike, the son of Ray and Mildred, and his wife Kay, who purchased the store in 1978, invite customers and employees (both past and present) to a special celebration on Sept. 19, 1996, 5-8 p.m. at the American Legion Building in Lenox.

The Sept. 19 Smorgasbord will be a return to past years, when Ray and Mildred Cheese, along with business neighbor Jerry Sheridan, offered a community smorgasbord each year for area residents.

Cheese's Shurfine Food Center and employees have been preparing for the 50th anniversary for a number of years. Just this year, an extensive, inside-and-out remodeling was completed. The store now features wider aisles greater selection, newer furnishings and greater customer convenience than ever before.

Cheese's: A Lenox tradition for five decades

While working before and after school in the mid-1960's, Mike Cheese most likely wasn't thinking 30 years ahead to the 50th anniversary of Cheese's grocery store.

Now we're in the mid-1990's, and the 50th anniversary of the store has arrived.

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Mike still remembers the traditions of the 1960's and will bring one of those traditions - a community smorgasbord -back on Sept. 19 to help celebrate 50 years of business in Lenox.

After the high school years, Mike earned a degree from Creighton University in Omaha, then returned to his hometown to work for his father, Ray. Mike became store manager in 1972, and six years later Mike and wife Kay purchased the business from Ray and Mildred.

The beginnings of the store date back nearly 100 years when George Cheese (Mike's great-great uncle) operated a General Store in the building now occupied by the Lenox Town Centre. Prior to opening that store George had worked in a grocery store and had been a partner in a Lenox butcher shop.

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Ray Cheese returned from World War II in 1946 to start up the family tradition again. He opened the grocery store on Main Street, in the building where Keast Accounting is now located. The family, and the community, out-grew the location, so in 1959 Ray built the store at its present location to better serve his customers.

Mike appreciates the impact of that 1959 move. Today major supermarkets are commonly found on highways and

commonly found on highways and community outskirts, but the move off Main Street was a venture not common back then. Cheese's was among the first

back then. Cheese's was among the first grocery stores in southwest Iowa to favor an off-Main location.

A few years after 1959 construction, Mike was in high school and working in various capacities before and after school. Those duties were "character builders," as are the duties performed today by students who have found part-time employment at Cheese's. Cheese's.

Since becoming store owners, Mike and Kay have overseen numerous remodeling projects. The latest was one of the largest: an inside-and-out remodeling project that was completed this year. The new look features wider aisles, an impressive produce selection, some 20 yards of freezer cases, and an expanded meat department.

Another major change in the continual effort to provide top-notch customer service came a few years ago when Mike and Kay decided to invest in equipment for scanning of UPC codes. Using the scanners, check-out clerks can quickly and accurately process even multicart grocery purchases. For a number of years, Cheese's has also been a favorite stop for movie watchers. The video rental department includes hundreds of movies. department includes hundreds of movies, including new releases weekly, and a variety of video game cartridges. One can almost hear Ray wonder, "What will they think of next?"

Cheese's Shurfine Food Center is a member of the 450-store Affiliated Foods Cooperative in Norfolk, Neb. The cooperative allows members such as Cheese's to purchase products at lower prices in the never-ending effort to pass real savings along to customers.

Mike and Kay are very proud of the business and, along with their valued employees, continue to strive for even more improvements. The clean, well-equipped supermarket with competitive prices has seen a number of improvements during the past 50 years; the next 50 years are likely to bring the same.


